
- I. Using a sheet of art paper aligned portrait ways, split it into three equal sections lengthways and four equal sections across ways.
 This splits the page into twelve boxes.
- 2. Using the initial of your first name or surname, draw the initial, double lined (like bubble letters), onto the page. When doing this, make sure that the initial crosses as many lines as possible. Also try to make sure that you do not leave sections which are too small to paint or colour.
- 3. This is the bit that pupils may find confusing. Choose two colours (or one colour and white as in the example below). Start painting in the top left box. The rule then is that once you meet a line you change colour. This means that no two sections that touch should be coloured the same. Another way to explain this is that sections that touch corners should be the same colour. Paint the picture working across the page row by row. If you started the first row using red, as in the example below, you should start the second row white and so on.
- 4. Allow the paint to dry overnight. Trace over the all the lines with a thick black permanent marker. This makes the sections stand out more.
- 5. Displaying all the class's initials together on the wall really looks well.
